Community Outreach

Ms. Phyllis Savoy heads our social outreach efforts to assist families dealing with food, housing, and employment issues. 383 individuals/families were served via support of local food pantry located in the Commodore John Rodgers School (CJR). The Food Pantry consistently surpassed the quarterly goals and is a much needed resource for families. During Thanksgiving and Christmas more families were served due to the wonderful food donation from the students at Maryvale School and Carolyn Geraghty and team. Workforce Readiness

Seven participants successfully completed the

90 Hours Office of Child Care Pre-school Pre-service training. They completed over 100 hours of instruction and classroom internship hours. Five are employed in child care centers! Six participants completed an additional 45 hours of instruction specifically for caring for infants and toddlers. **Thanks, Laura.**

Youth

96 youth were involved in community service projects this year which included community clean-ups, organized activities with the elderly, and teen leadership activities. 33 youth participated in the Summer Peace Camp. This year's theme was Alternatives to Violence as well as "All About Mason Bees." Children participated in activities during the camp that identified tools and strategies to use when faced with difficult situations. Such as kindness, honesty, and thinking before reacting. The older campers built mason bee habitats. They learned about the special habit preferred by the mason bees and each camper built a habitat. During this summer's camp one of our senior campers showed great leadership and became a "student staff." Dontrey Smith was an enormous help. The Americorps volunteers, Mackenzie Keefe and Victoria Moore, assisted with the anti-bullying program for 4th and 5th graders at City Springs

Elementary, worked with the McElderry Park Teen Initiative, and mentored and tutored youth in the Refugee Youth Project and Mi Espacio through Casa de Maryland. They also worked with Step Ahead, a youth directed (15-18yo) program and assisted the classroom staff at the St. Vincent de Paul Head Start Program-Patterson Park location. They assisted in the afterschool programs at Wolfe Street Academy. Thanks to Mackenzi, Victoria, Phyllis, Sr. Tracy, Lynn Wynn, and Dontrey Smith for a super year!

Health Promotion

Student nurses from Johns Hopkins and our extraordinary staff were quite busy this year. 158 individuals/families received health services this year. Residents at Apostolic Towers received quarterly blood pressure screening and health consultation from our Health Coordinator, Carm Dorsey, RN. Phyllis Savoy outreached to parents of CJR and Head Start students and community members coming to the CJR food pantry. Health information regarding coughs, colds, and influenza was distributed during food distribution as well as health and community resources. The student nurses provided health education and activities to families receiving care at the Esperanza Center. We also began teaching the required Office of Child Care
