# 2016-2017 at a glance

#### **Community Outreach**

Ms. Phyllis Savoy heads our social outreach efforts to assist families dealing with food, housing, and employment issues. 142 individuals were served this past program year. We began to focus our outreach efforts to the homeless individuals in our community with distributions of food and personal hygiene supplies. Any donations of food and clothing is shared with Assisi House and Gift of Hope. During Thanksgiving and Christmas more families were served due to the wonderful food donation from the students at Maryvale School and Carolyn Geraghty and team. Thanks to the Maryvale students, Phyllis Savoy, volunteers, and Carolyn Geraghty.

#### **Adult Education**

Our Americorps-Adult Education volunteer, Mikhail Orpia, worked closely with the McElderry Park Neighborhood Association to recruit neighborhood young adults. 20 participants enrolled in the GED program and we were able to retain 16 students. All progressed at their own pace and 4 students have taken subject specific tests. **Thanks, Mikhail for superb teaching!** 

#### **Workforce Readiness**

Eleven participants successfully completed the 90 Hours Office of Child Care Pre-school Pre-service training. They completed over 100 hours of instruction and classroom internship hours. Seven are employed in child care centers! **Thanks, Laura and Tina Coleman.** 

#### Youth

58 youth were involved in activities and community service projects this past program year. They pitched in to clean the community as well as the center. The Wolfe Street Academy after school kids did a superb job on the windows! 33 youth participated in the Summer Peace Camp where we focus on being respectful, kind, honest, and caring. Campers participated in activities during the camp that identified tools and strategies to use when faced with difficult situations. Science is always a big part of camp. Sr. Tracy continues to provide the tools that inspire young scientists. Our Americorps-Youth Advocate volunteer, Krystal Dorsey, assisted the classroom staff at the St. Vincent de Paul Head Start Program-Patterson Park location. She and Mikhail as well as Barbara Moore assisted in the afterschool programs at Wolfe Street Academy. Thanks to Krystal, Phyllis, Sr. Tracy, Mikhail, and **Barbara**!

#### **Health Promotion**

Student nurses from Johns Hopkins and our extraordinary staff were quite busy this year. 166 individuals received health services this year. Residents of Apostolic Towers received ongoing case management and health consultation from our Health Coordinator, Carm Dorsey, RN. Phyllis Savoy provided senior dance classes. The student nurses provided health education and activities to families receiving care at the Esperanza Center. We also provided the required Office of Child Care Medication Administration training for child care providers monthly.
