Program News

Community Outreach

For nearly 10 years our social outreach program has been led by Ms. Phyllis Savoy. Working with families dealing with food, housing, and employment issues requires patience, energy, and creativity. Phyllis puts her whole heart and body into helping others. Her love is working with children and although she will be very much missed at the Julie Center, Furley Elementary School is gaining a wonderful interactive arts teacher. **Good luck Phyllis and thanks for your dedication to kids and the community**.

Our Thanksgiving food distribution was a great success. The students at Maryvale School and Carolyn Geraghty and team out did themselves donating enough food to provide 80 baskets for the residents at Apostolic Towers, 25 baskets for Tench Tilghman Elementary School, 8 baskets for Commodore John Rogers Elementary School, 15 baskets for families at St. Vincent de Paul Head Start, and 6 baskets for community families. Dee's Place, Assisi House, and Gift of Hope received boxes of food to stock their pantries. Our own pantry is stocked with food to provide easy to prepare meals for our homeless neighbors and families in need. Thanks to the Marvvale students, volunteers, and Carolyn Geraghty.

Adult Education

Our Americorps-Adult Education volunteer, Mikhail Orpia, completed his time with Americorps and he has passed the baton to our newest Americorps volunteer, Ginikachi Nwoke. Mikhail worked closely with the McElderry Park Neighborhood Association to recruit neighborhood young adults. 15 participants enrolled in the GED program and we were able to retain 10 students. All progressed at their own pace and 4 students completed subject specific tests. 1 student received her GED. **Thanks, Mikhail for superb teaching and welcome Ginikachi.**

Workforce Readiness

Eleven participants successfully completed the Child Care Training Program. Partnering with the Instituto de Educación Infantil this class received all training in Spanish. The students completed over 150 hours of instruction and participated in an internship with the St. Vincent de Paul Head Start Program. In the Spring a class of twelve successfully completed the intensive 45 hours Infant & Toddlers training. **Congratulations!**

Youth

Throughout last program year, 86 youth were involved with after school activities and summer camp. Afterschool activities included chess, karate, and yoga. The kids in the yoga class created a gorgeous and inspiring mural. Their talent is incredible! This summer screen painting artist Michael Siepp worked with the kids to paint the window screens on the Lombard Street side of the building.
